



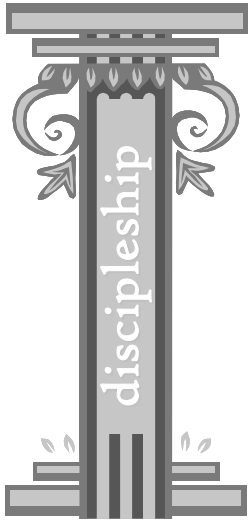

With the coming of springtime, your Church Council is grateful for the hard work of our Worship and Music Ministry during the winter months. WALKING SOFTLY ON THE EARTH

Many devices and appliances draw electricity even when they are turned off. This characteristic is known by several names: vampire power, phantom load, or standby energy.

Whatever the name, it is electricity that is paid for but serves no useful function.

The list of devices includes: chargers for cell phones, cameras, iPods® (all mp3 players and their cousins), computers, DVD players, TV's. Microwave ovens, coffee makers, and even your hair dryer are also on the list. The average wasted energy from residential electric usage is estimated to be 5% to 10% and is increasing.



The solution is to PULL THE PLUG or put several devices that are used together on a power strip and turn off the power to the strip when the devices are not in use. Remove phones and other devices from the charges as soon as they have fully charged and unplug the charger. A computer may be drawing 75 watts when in use but draw only about 21 watts in sleep mode and only 3 watts when off, and those 3 watts will disappear if the plug is pulled. DVD players and game consoles can draw almost as much power in ready mode as when they are in use. Even closing the microwave door when not in use can reduce the energy usage from 25 watts to 3 watts.

Think about how you use electrical appliances. Develop the habit of turning off lights and unplugging devices that are not in use. You could easily see a 10% reduction in your electric bill and you will be reducing your carbon footprint by reducing the demand for electricity which is still primarily produced from carbon-dioxide emitting fuels.

From Your Pastor

MIDDLE SCHOOL MINISTRY

After receiving lots of feedback and initiating broad conversation, we have decided to create a more intentional ministry specifically for middle schoolers at Diamond Lake. With the exception of confirmation classes, our current 7th – 12th graders are together for all activities and programs, but 7th graders are at an entirely different developmental stage than 12th graders and have very different faith questions. It is important to give our young people an opportunity to learn and grow in ways appropriate to their age and developmental stages. Many have also noticed year after year that our 6th graders tire of the rotational Sunday school program with children much younger than they. Given these factors, we have decided to start with baby steps toward a middle school ministry. We are not planning any major changes to the confirmation program at this point, but this fall, we will have a new non-rotational Sunday school classroom for youth in grades 6 and 7. Because this fall's 8th graders have already been meeting regularly with the older youth, they will remain with the older group, but in future years, the middle school Sunday morning class will consist of youth in grades 6, 7, and 8. Of course, we believe in the value of intergenerational activities. Some traditional events in the church that are very effectively done with youth and children of different ages will remain mixed, and we will continually evaluate our programs and make changes as needed. We always welcome feedback and ideas. Please see Pastor Amy with any concerns.

COUNCIL CORNER

Greetings everyone. Spring is here! The grass is turning green and the trees are leafing out. What a wonderful time of year!

I am reporting on the March Council meeting. Pastor Mark reported that a Visitation Ministry has been established to take over Pastor Reany's role in visiting Diamond Lake's shut-ins. Pastor Mark provided training to the eleven volunteers in this Ministry. Thanks to all these volunteers, the visitation list is being expanded to include 37 households. Pastors Mark and Amy will continue to do visitation for those that are hospitalized.

The Minneapolis Synod Convention will be held the end of April and Diamond Lake will be well represented. Attendees will include Pastors Mark and Amy and three Council members: Melinda Batz, Nick Roder, and Ron Youngquist.

Pastor Amy provided an overview of the Youth Ministry. She would like to see greater involvement of our Youth in church activities. She challenged the Council to identify ways in which each of the ministry columns can better serve and teach our Youth.

Jon Brunsberg reported that the church insurance policy is up for renewal. The premium is up about 20% for the new policy in large part because our policy had to cover part of the cost to repair the damages caused by the car that ran into the building. Jon is also seeking estimates from other insurance companies.

April 1st the 70th anniversary for Diamond Lake. Thanks to the planning by the Stewardship and Archives Ministries, there will be a celebration on Sunday April 18 beginning with a Temple Talk. Cake and coffee will be served between services. The Archives Ministry will display many pictures chronicling Diamond Lake's history.

Keith Koenig, our Property Manager, met with the Council to present a list of church maintenance and update projects. These projects ranged from ongoing maintenance needs to visionary updates. Each project was discussed individually. Foremost on the list is the need for repair of the stained glass windows in the sanctuary. These repairs will cost about \$15,000 and need to be done this year. The Council authorized the Properties Ministry to move forward on the window repairs. Several other projects were identified that will need to be done in the next two to three years. Keep in mind that the sanctuary is nearly 60 years old and the Activities Building is a youthful 50! The Council will be looking at options for these critical maintenance projects. You will be hearing more about this in the coming weeks.

WORSHIP VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Many people are involved in the Sunday morning worship services. Ushers, greeters, and readers are needed on a weekly basis.

- Usher responsibilities include greeting the people who come to worship, distribute the bulletins and announcements, assist people to a seat if needed, assist in collection of the offering, prepare the communion rail & guide people to the communion rail during communion when necessary, and straighten the sanctuary after the service.
- Greeter responsibility is to do simply that – greet the visitor and guide them to the appropriate area of the church.
- Reader responsibility is to read the lessons and psalm during the worship service.

Other volunteer opportunities:

- Sound responsibilities include setting out/putting away microphones, operate the sound system and record worship services.
- Communion server responsibilities include setting up for communion, assisting in distribution of communion and cleaning up after communion (communion is served the first and third Sunday of each month & at special services).
- Children's message responsibility includes researching and delivering the Children's Message on Sunday mornings.

The Worship and Music Ministry is inviting anyone who is interested in any of these positions to contact the church office. Training sessions will be scheduled for the fall, but individual training is available at any time. The greatest need for ushers is at the 11:00 a.m.

NOTES FROM CAMP:

The 2010 Diamond Lake Women's Retreat

When I first learned that Diamond Lake held an annual women's retreat, I was intrigued but nervous to attend. What if I didn't know anybody there? What if I was forced to speak in front of a group (not my favorite thing)? What if I had to sleep in the same room as 20 women who snore? This year I decided to throw all caution to the wind and make the trek to Camp Friendship, despite my growing list of concerns.

It helped that my good friend, Jenn Welbaum, invited me to go with her and even help lead a short craft session. And because we couldn't get there on Friday night in time for dinner we decided to share a gourmet picnic dinner in the car. After all, the theme of the retreat was "Taking Care of You" and good food is always a start.

The weekend, of course, turned out to be much more fun and fulfilling than I had anticipated. We had a wonderful speaker, Michelle Wuollet, who is a Life Coach and gave all of us a lot to think about and bring into our lives. We played lots of games and those of us who didn't want to participate (at any given moment) weren't pressured to. We also had a massive snack table that was open 24 hours a day. And the sleeping? We were in cabins with beds and each room within the cabins held 3 - 4 people so the noise from others was minimal.

When I asked the other retreaters what they most enjoyed about our time together, many said they found the power of mixed generations inspiring. Jan Johnson, one of planners, said, "I just loved getting to know several of the other younger members of Diamond Lake in a way I would never have had I not attended. It is just so much more personal. The mixture of ages is so appreciated by me as it adds a different twist to discussions and sharing."

Judy Peacock remarked, "The retreat is an opportunity to get to know other women in the congregation better and develop friendships. This year, I especially enjoyed getting acquainted with the younger women."

Lynne Skye echoed this sentiment with, "So many things stand out in my mind, but most of all I enjoyed spending time with DL women across the generations. We have so much we can learn from one another."

Of course, the retreat is based on our shared faith. Pat Lillehei found the power of prayer most inspirational. We were asked to read the book "90 Minutes in Heaven" for a brief book club-type discussion that was held after dinner on Saturday evening. The theme of the book is the power that can come from prayer. Pat found the book and discussion so moving that she shared the audio version of the book a second time with her husband upon her return to home. She said, "I did again pray this morning for each and every one of our retreat women. God has a purpose for each and every one of us and He is with us always as we Love, Live, Learn, and Leave our Legacy. (Love, Live, Learn and Leave Our Legacy were themes from Michelle's presentation.) I know everyone has a very full life. If the wagon gets too full to pull, we can be there to push together for a smoother walk. I am always blessed when I am with my golden friendships and this retreat gave me the opportunity to develop many silver friendships."

I was curious about what motivates Jan Johnson to stay on the planning committee year after year. She said, "I think what motivated me at the beginning and still does is that I remember when my children were young and growing up life was really crazy at times. For many years I always took a couple of days with some of my church friends and went on a retreat, sometimes with Diamond Lake and other times with another organization. Then suddenly those were discontinued and there was a gap of time when they weren't happening. When my daughter started having children, she remembered my retreating and it was again like putting myself back into those days and realizing the opportunity should be there for the young moms as well as women of different ages and situations. So with my daughter as my partner we organized the first retreat at Camp Friendship about 10 or 11 years ago."

As a "young" mom (actually an old mom with young children) I can attest to the fact that we do need to take time out for ourselves. But kids are not a prerequisite for retreating. Others were there who did not have kids but were in a position in their lives where they needed some time for renewal and growth. It's my belief that the retreat gave every one of us something tangible that we can carry with us for months, if not years, to come.

The retreat will be announced again next spring. If you find yourself still unsure of whether or not you think it would be a positive experience, Shelly Clausen offers up this: "I probably would not have attended the retreat if it weren't for the personal invitation by three church members. I went not knowing what to expect and came away with a wonderful experience! I was able to meet people whose faces I'd seen at church but whose names I didn't know, plus I got to know other people better. It was a nice time to get away, relax and renew."

Judy Peacock had a final thought: "Reluctant attendees should know that the facilities at Camp Friendship are great! You don't have to sleep in a room with a dozen other women, and there are nice bathrooms everywhere!"

POLISHING THE DIAMOND



Last week we celebrated Diamond Lake's 70th Birthday. With longevity comes the need for maintaining our beautiful *gem*. We are grateful for the many Property Ministry volunteers who do a *stellar* job, mostly behind the scenes, making our Diamond *sparkle*. There are some projects, however, that require professional contractors. The Property Ministry has identified a number of significant projects requiring professional contractors that will need attention over the next 12 to 18 months.

They include:

- stained glass windows – maintenance & repairs
- reroof Lakeview Room (areas not done last summer)
- external painting (mostly lakeside & back of church)
- gutters of main church (60 years old & rusted through)
- seal parking lot (protecting our investment)
- replace windows (specific windows that have failed over time)
- chairs for Lakeview Room (many are broken)

These projects are NOT in the 2010 budget. Therefore, we have begun discussing ways to finance these projects. We have already started the stained glass window work due to the discovery of significant deterioration. We will provide frequent updates about these projects in the coming months. NEWSLETTERS & DODOS



It's time to send our newsletter the way of the dodo . . . sort of. Beginning with our June newsletter, we will send the *Diamond Lake Lutheran* electronically to everyone with an email address. We will not be sending it in the "snail mail" unless a member does not have email.

Over the past year, we have worked hard to clean up our records, delete duplicates, correct emails, phone numbers, status, etc. During that process, we have pared down from snail-mailing nearly 400 newsletters to 253. The difference is those of you that elected to read the newsletter online. And we thank you!

The next step in the process is to eliminate as many mailings as possible. The United States Post Office has made life in the bulk mailing business more and more difficult over the past six months. The cost to mail our newsletters used to be approximately \$25.00 for the entire batch. The last run to the bulk mail center (April) incurred a cost of more than \$100.00! Further, the rules for assembling the newsletter, affixing the clear tabs, and bundling them for bulk mail have created a great deal more work for the staff and the volunteers. It makes good economic sense to reduce the number of newsletters that are mailed.

It also makes good sense ecologically. Diamond Lake supports all efforts to be a little greener if at all possible. We call it *Caring for Creation*.

If there is some reason that you cannot retrieve the newsletter electronically even though you read emails, let us know. We can either put you back on the snail mail list, or you can pick up your newsletter here at church if you regularly attend. We can either reserve a copy for you, or you can grab one of the extra copies that we always print and place in the kiosks.

YOUTH FUNDRAISER: FLEA MARKET

We are in need of someone (many ones) to coordinate our Youth Fundraiser. We are hoping to have a Flea Market (like a mini-garage sale) here at The Diamond. We do NOT have a date as of yet. Once we have a team, we will decide the date. The general concept is:

4. Shop the Flea Market. The proceeds will, again, go to either the Youth or to the seller. If the seller IS one of our spectacular Youth, so much the better.
